Table	N/a	N/a	See Figure 2 and Figure 4 . Table size: 325cm X 120cm (I X h), normal height (can be adjusted to fit specific experimental needs)
Location stick	N/a	N/a	See Figure 2 and Figure 4. Length: 325cm. Coloured stickers indicate the different locations (can be adjusted to fit specific experimental needs)
Indication stick	N/a	N/a	See Figure 3.
Objects	N/a	N/a	See sheet: 'Objects'. Printed shapes, inserted in plastic button badges (can be adjusted to fit specific experimental needs, e.g., use coins to manipulate ownership)
Badges	Amazon	B01CI7XZHW	Take off the pin and place printed objects inside the badge
Curtains	N/a	N/a	See Figure 2 and Figure 4. Dark curtains to block out any spatial cues from the room/wall, and prevent clever Hans-effects (can be adjusted to fit specific experimental needs)
Table cloth	N/a	N/a	See Figure 2 and Figure 4 . To block out any spatial cues on the table, needs to be heavy and preferably non-crease material.
